PAOLO Perrone

Understanding Conservation Transactions from Start to Finish

This presentation will draw upon dozens of conservation projects' lessons learned, focusing on partnerships needed for success. These include obvious relationships with government funding agencies and other environmental groups, but also with instrumental actors such as titleholders to properties, appraisers, media, regulatory bodies, and philanthropic donors. This discussion will explore how an advocacy organization or activists focused on protecting properties or opposing planned developments can transition to an effective partner in a conservation real estate transaction, as well as provide the basics of a publicly and/or privately funded deal. The information included will be helpful for organizations with a "willing seller" as well as those still in an advocacy/adversarial role.

Creative Mechanisms for Achieving 30x30

It will take more than public funding to meet 30x30. Thankfully, creative mechanisms are on the rise and, paired with public funding, will help protect natural and working lands and water. This presentation shares innovative agreements and policy actions that resulted in the protection of 250,000+ acres across California. Three mechanisms include innovative public policies, binding agreements in collaboration with landowners, and new private funds. Learn about what these mechanisms have in common and how they work. Emerging mechanisms on the horizon will also be featured that focus on climate resilience credits, transfer of development rights, and advance mitigation innovations.

Preserving Land Through Mitigation Transactions

Environmental laws and regulations require that potential impacts of development projects on species, habitat, and farmland are taken into consideration. Measures taken to "mitigate" the impacts of a development project are required when significant impacts are identified during the approval process. One way to mitigate the impacts is to permanently protect land through conservation easements or other land use restrictions. Rivers & Lands Conservancy (RLC) is a non-profit land trust that holds and manages over 1,600 acres of permanently protected open space as a direct result of mitigation. This presentation will explain what mitigation is, why it matters, and RLC's role in land conservation through the mitigation process.

Seeing Conservation Transactions Through the Landowners' Perspective

This presentation will focus on working with private landowners to purchase their property as conservation lands. Emphasis will be given to the landowners' motivations to sell, how to build trust, handling ongoing communications, and structuring transactions. Concepts such as bargain sales, landowner donations, fair market value, and landowner expectations will be featured.

Paolo Perrone is a Project Director working statewide for The Nature Conservancy. He primarily conducts land acquisition for large landscape-scale conservation, and also supports efforts to expand access to public lands, generate funding for parks and open space, and assist partner organizations in their conservation efforts. Paolo previously worked as the Southern California Conservation Fellow for The Trust for Public Land and as a consultant for a variety of mitigation and conservation projects. He holds a bachelor's degree in Politics from the University of California, Santa Cruz, and a master's degree in Environment and Development from the London School of Economics.
